

#### How Sorry Do You Need to Be? by Pastor Daniel Bennett

Contrasting Protestant and Roman Catholic Understandings of Repentance

Today I was reading a book by a Roman Catholic apologist named James Akin. It is entitled *The Salvation Controversy* and was recommended to me by a friend with whom I am in an ongoing and friendly debate. When I use the term friendly, of course, I do not mean trivial. Our differences are real, profound and of eternal consequence.

As I read Akin's book this morning, I was reminded of a recent sermon in which I discussed the atonement. My argument, as I'm sure you remember, was that if one doesn't understand the substitutionary atonement of Christ—the truth that Christ died in my place—one doesn't understand Christ or His mission.

In a chapter entitled, "Doing Penance," Akin quotes several biblical passages, James 4:8-10 among them:

Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners, and

purify your hearts, you double-minded. Be wretched and mourn and weep. Let your laughter be turned to mourning and your joy to gloom. Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you.

He then argues that Protestants fail to take Scripture's injunction to mourn for sin seriously:

Protestants often skim over...[verses like James 4:8-10] without taking their implications seriously. This is shown especially in sermons on the passage from James. Protestant pastors often tell their congregations to humble themselves before the Lord so that they will be lifted up, but they rob the self-humbling (self-humiliation) of all its content because they fail to tell the congregations to humble themselves in the way James has indicated: "grieve, mourn, and wail; change your laughter into mourning and your joy into gloom." should have genuine remorse for sin that causes greater humility on our parts.

The problem is what he *means* by penance. If Akin were simply arguing that believers need to show genuine contrition and mourning over sin, we'd be in complete agreement. We'd be in agreement because this is precisely what 2 Corinthians 7:10-11 describes:

> For godly grief produces a repentance that leads to salvation without regret, whereas worldly grief produces death. For see what earnestness this godly grief has produced in you, but also what eagerness to clear yourselves, what indignation, what fear, what longing, what zeal, what punishment! At every point you have proved yourselves innocent in the matter.

The problem is that Akin isn't advocating biblical repentance. He's advocating penance as part of the sacramental system. Here's what the Catechism of the Catholic Church says:

Like all the sacraments. Penance is a liturgical action. The elements of the celebration are ordinarily these: a greeting and blessing from the priest, reading the word of God to illuminate the conscience and elicit contrition. and an exhortation to repentance; the confession , which acknowledges sins and makes them known to the priest; the imposition and acceptance of a penance; the priest's absolution: a prayer of thanksgiving and praise and dismissal with the blessing of the priest (1480).

This "penance" is far different than the remorse and humility Akin describes. Surely this formulaic ritual I think Akin, on the face of it, makes a valid point. We was not what James had in mind when he discussed contrition! This system is not about humbling oneself so that Christ can exalt them. It is about engaging in the sacramental system of the church so that a man the priest—can absolve you.

> I believe that this poor understanding of repentance stems from a poor understanding of how Christ's atoning work is applied. Instead of seeing Christ's atoning work as the basis on which God declares us wholly righteous. Roman Catholics believe in an infused righteousness. Righteousness, they teach, is slowly applied to us as we work to earn it.

But Scripture teaches us differently. Gold's value is based largely on its scarcity, not so much its functional worth. What can you really "do" with gold? But the righteousness that comes from God is valuable not only because it is scarce—no one but God has it—but because it has intrinsic value as well. With it we can have a relationship with God. And, what's more, this righteousness cannot be purchased or earned— it can only be given. We who were dead in our trespasses and sin are made alive because of God's incredible grace through faith (Eph 2:1-10).

What then is the importance of repentance in the life of the believer? There are many benefits for the believer and these benefits are received and enjoyed on the basis of God's grace...not on the basis of our works.

What is true in our salvation continues to be true in our sanctification. Only God can receive credit for our salvation and only God can receive the glory for our repentance. Our repentance is not to be some formulaic repetition of words, but genuine, heart-felt remorse as we turn from our sin.

### Missions Agencies Created by the Bethany Fellowship of Churches

The Bethany Fellowship of Churches (BFC) is a partnership between Bethany Baptist Church and the two churches Bethany Baptist has planted, Living Hope Community Church and Bethany Community Church. The three churches in the BFC pool our resources to have a combined missions ministry.

At times, the BFC has believed God is calling us to a particular missions ministry, but there is not a missions agency which can employ a full time missionary staff. In these instances, we have created our own missions agencies which fall under the leadership of the BFC. When we create a missions agency, we also create an advisory committee to oversee it. The advisory committee, missionaries, and volunteers of the missions agency fall under the authority of the BFC elder board, which is the combined elder boards of the three churches. To date, the BFC has created three missions agencies.

- 1. Peoria Area Campus Ministries In creating PACM, we work with Campus Crusade for Christ in an effort to more effectively proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ to college students in the Peoria area. As students submit their lives to Christ, PACM strives to help them get plugged into a local church. Our missionaries currently serving under PACM are: Micaiah and Erin Wilmoth, Jim and Joelle Kurczodyna, Joanne Borchert, Kyle Talbot, and Amanda Mullery. PACM could not exist without volunteers from BFC churches and other churches in the Peoria area.
- 2. Bethany Biblical Counseling Ministries BBCM was created to assist the BFC in proclaiming the sufficiency of God's Word as we seek to care for people's souls in a God-exalting manner. In addition to offering Biblical counseling free of charge, BBCM

seeks to equip laypeople, church leaders, and ministry leaders in applying God's Word to their lives and ministry. This ministry offers counseling and counseling training to anyone the tri-county area, regardless of church affiliation. Kent and Janell Kloter are our missionaries currently serving under BBCM. BBCM depends on volunteers and supporters from BFC churches and other churches in the Peoria area.

3. Global Partnership Ministries In creating GPM, we partnered with Eternity Minded Ministries and the Luis Palau Association, two international evangelistic ministries, to build up and strengthen the Church worldwide through evangelism and discipleship. GPM strives to help people use their spiritual gifts to proclaim the Gospel and administer humanitarian aid, particularly internationally, in order to help meet the spiritual and physical needs of people. Gary and Barb Losey are our missionaries currently serving under GPM. Through GPM, the BFC is sending a short-term missions team to Rwanda this June.

### Did you know?

The South Side Mission Benevolence Center offers free food, clothing, furniture, and appliances to the poor of Peoria, all in the name of Jesus Christ. The Gospel is shared with customers each time the Benevolence Center opens and Bible studies are also held there. The Benevolence Center, which helps up to 1,000 different people each month, is in need of lightly used clothing, household goods, furniture, and appliances. They are located at 2919 W. Garden St. in Peoria and can be contacted at 309-673-1041.

#### Youth Ministry




We are seeing God's continued work in the hearts of our students as our group grows in number and spiritual maturity. We are thankful for our adult leaders who faithfully
